If you loved her for her own sake, would you not rejoice in her joy and be happy in her happiness?"

the incarnation, and rejoice in the reality that if you are a Christian you have already passed from "death to life," and can await the glorious moment when we will be united again with those who have already passed into resurrection life.



### **Ministry News**

The highlight of our year was the visit to the **Philippines** in February. After our visit to family in Australia we arrived a little earlier than the main team in Manila and spent the weekend with Victor and Rosilee Fernandez and their church. It was Valentines Weekend and we spoke at a special event for couples and at the service on Sunday. Victor Jnr. and his wife Rosilee have pioneered this church which is growing and reaching a wide cross section of people. There is a vibrant youth work, but they are also meeting the profound needs around them and feeding the poor. We were most encouraged by what we experienced there.

We then joined the Living Waters Church team and flew to Iloilo for two weeks of hard work refurbishing the church building which we had provided almost 15 years ago. We were primarily there to do practical work but on the Sunday many of the team shared in the Sunday Worship service which was a powerful and significant time.

Back at home we continue to be actively involved with Living Waters Church and have travelled to Norwich, Wigan, Scotland, Wales and Hemel Hempstead for ministry weekends and Joyce has spoken at special Ladies Day's. We see a lot of folk on a one to one basis and the Word for the Week opens up many situations where we are able to bring help and encouragement to those who make contact.
